signed into law on July 2, 1914. This expanded vocational agriculture and home demonstration programs in rural America. From those agrarian beginnings, cooperative extension has evolved to serve a wide range of human needs, while continuing to support agriculture, conservation, and a healthy economy in both rural and urban settings.

Today AgriLife Extension Service in Fort Bend welcomes the opportunity to provide clubs, schools, organizations, businesses and individuals a wide variety of research-based educational programs. This year's program held on February 6, 2014 at the Fort Bend County Fairgrounds was a huge success because of partner-

ships, diversity, and technology. Participants included 230 paid guests, 15 commercial exhibitors and over 25 volunteers. This program was a 7-county partnership. We broke new ground by adding a program segment from our Food & Consumer Sciences division. Local FCS agent Dianne Gertson gave a real time Dinner Tonight! cooking demonstration during the lunch hour of the program. Guests learned how to take their home-grown produce and prepare something tasty and healthy out of it. Moving ahead further in responding to the needs of our diverse audience, we developed

break-out sessions where guests could choose the topics that best suited their needs. Even more impressive, as freezing weather limited speakers from trav-

eling to the event, we were able to utilize our web conferencing software and internet capabilities to stream those presenters in real-time. As evaluation results are returned, we'll move forward with our final interpretation, but verbal comments from guests say that they all look forward to coming back next year!

Agriculture Microloan Program

Our first agriculture microloan investigation program for 2014 was held on March 1 under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Program of PVAMU. Fifteen attendees with interest in starting or renovating a small farm or ranch operation participated. This program was ideally suited for small & family operations, for beginning farmers & ranchers and for socially disadvantaged producers. Microloans can be used for all approved operating expenses as authorized by the USDA Farm Service Agency Operating Loan Program, including but not limited to the initial start-up expenses. Topics and categories that were discussed included: annual expenses such as seed, plants/liners, fertilizer, pesticides, utilities, and property rental; marketing, promotions & distribution expenses; family living expenses; purchase of livestock, equipment and other materials essential to farm operations; farm improvements such as wells, coolers/freezers, barns, greenhouses/hoop-houses; irrigation systems; and delivery vehicles. Approved applicants are eligible to obtain up to \$35,000.

Pesticide Applicator Trainings ... a value to licensed applicators

As we begin 2014, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Fort Bend County has kicked off another pesticide Applicator training event on Jan. 14. A total of 35 area individuals received the needed instructions associated with continuing education units for TDA private pesticide and commercial/non-commercial pesticide applicators. Pesticide trainings are important to homeowners, farmers, ranchers, government employees and others needing to stay current and maintain legal status with TDA. The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service coordinated with TDA to present specific trainings based on the user group or groups targeted. Subjects ranged from pest ID/control, drift minimization, sprayer calibration, environmental protection, laws & regulations, IPM, right-of-way pest control and more.

CupCake Fun!



Sixteen very excited young people had a great time learning and snacking on January 3 at a fabulous fun-filled, full-day event entitled CupCake Fun. The goal of this new program was to teach kids how to make, design and decorate cupcakes for fun, for gifts, and for donations year round. Coastal Prairie Master Naturalists

On Saturday, February 22, Jim Butcher, CPTMN past-president, led a group of 8 boy scouts from Wolf Pack 940 on an interpretive walk through Seabourne Creek Nature Park. Included in the interpretation were the 4 SCNP Ecosystems, 5 trees, 5 birds and 5 native plants. He also spoke about the history of the area, and they even left speaking a few words of Karankawa. Way to go, Jim!

Better Living for Texans—'Get the Facts' Series

A BLT series entitled 'Get the Facts' was taught at Christa McAuliffe Middle School with 31 mothers present. The attendees learned: 1) the difference between a serving size and a portion; 2) how to estimate common serving sizes using food models; and 3) how the use of proper serving sizes are required to create a healthy, balanced meal. Participants understood the Nutrition Facts label and the consequences of consuming saturated fat and trans fat, and learned sodium and processed foods and the effects of sodium on blood pressure. Evaluation results using a post survey indicated participants plan to use the Nutrition Facts label to determine the amount of food to eat and to choose products lower in fat and sodium. Post survey results revealed that 100% of participants recognize the difference between a serving size and a portion. In addition, post survey results show that 100% of participants understand that 1 in 3 Americans have high blood pressure.
