AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES/HORTICULTURE Gods On & Four

On Feb. 8, at the Fort Bend County Fairgrounds, the 39th Annual Vegetable Conference provided educational topics for small scale vegetable producers. CEUs for pesticide applicator licensing were offered in Laws & Regulations and Integrated Pest Management. State Representative Stan Kitzman gave opening comments, and Fort Bend County Judge KP George visited during a break. Every Fort Bend County Extension staff member helped in some way, and many volunteers made the event successful.

The Fort Bend County Master Gardener Association (FBCMGA) is dedicated to education and outreach. **Produce** harvested from demonstration gardens is donated to local food pantries. The Association set a goal to grow and donate 2000 lbs. of fresh vegetables in 2023. Just before the holidays, the Vegetable Garden Team delivered the last donation of the year bringing their total to 1,870.75 lbs. of fresh produce (valued at \$2,571.01). Additionally, Fort Bend County Master Gardener Food Drives throughout the year brought in 924.25 **lbs. of food** (valued at \$1,056.99), bringing the grand total of Fresh Produce and Food Drive items collected and delivered in 2023 to 2,795.00 lbs. of food (roughly valued at \$3,627.99).

FBCMGA Fruit Tree Fundraiser sale was held on Feb. 10. Over 1,300 trees were sold to more than 600 customers. More than 100 Master Gardener Volunteers were present to interact and educate customers on their Fruit Tree selections.

The 2024 Grow Your Own series kicked off the first class on Jan. 20 on the topic of Fruit Trees. Total registration was 225, 91 attended in person, and 200 viewed online. The second class on Feb. 17 on the topic of Creating Healthy Garden Soil drew 250 registrants with **73** in person, and 50 views online as of yet.

The 2024 Landscape Success series, offered online only on the fourth Friday each month, kicked off with "Landscape Basics" on Feb. 23 with 300 registered, 95 participating virtually in real time, and 50 viewings afterward on YouTube so far.

The Costal Prairie Master Naturalist Chapter hosted several successful outreach events this quarter. Monthly nature walks focusing on specific areas of interest such as birding, entomology, and plant identification reached over 180 people in Jan. and Feb. Most events are open to the public. The chapter has also worked with youth groups like the Girl Scouts and Montessori schools to educate youth on

Fort Bend County AgriLife Extension hosted the Texas Advanced Master Gardener - Compost Training, Dec. 6-8, 2023. Twenty-four (24) Certified Extension Master Gardeners from 17 counties participated, taking deep dives into the topic of compost to receive certification. These Master Gardeners were very enthusiastic with great ideas about making a difference in their communities. The training consisted of presentations from Extension Specialists, Extension Master Gardeners, and Nursery & Farm Managers. Participants enjoyed field trips and hands-on compost activities.

PVAMU-Agriculture Agent, Abdul Hakeem, hosted an Agribusiness Planning workshop on Jan. 24 covering An Overview of Agricultural Appraisal and Guidelines to Qualify for Ag Evaluations using 'Wildlife Management' and 'Beekeeping' with 40 people attending. A Forest Workshop was held on Feb. 13 with 14 people, promoting urban forestry where more than 300 trees were distributed free of cost. And, a **Pollinator Gardens Workshop** was held on Feb. 20 as a joint workshop with Fort Bend County Master Gardeners. The purpose of this workshop was to educate general public about the importance of pollinators and which plants should be planted to provide pollen and nectar. There were 51 registered, **9** attended in person, and **19** people attended online.


4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

The 12 students were introduced to chocolate as a fruit, shown new culinary skills, and got to taste chocolates from around the world. They learned about chemistry of the body's reaction to eating a miracle berry, the anatomy of tongue, and the connection of sugar to the brain.

PVAMU - Extension Agent - Community & Economic Development, Janelle Johnson, is building a program from the ground up as the first of its kind in Fort Bend. Janelle earned her certification as a Freddie Mac CreditSmart Facilitator on Jan. 11 after completing 10 weeks of training and passing a test. She and Erica Knighton presented the Junior **Achievement Academy** at Brazos Bend Elementary School teaching Financial Literacy, Entrepreneurship, and Work Readiness skills during the 5-week program with 22 students. She is the local point of contact for the Houston Furniture Bank - Stafford Location, managing 300 vouchers for the Furniture Assistance Program that provides essential furniture to low-income families and individuals impacted by natural disasters, domestic violence, poverty, and mental health challenges. The program integrates financial literacy and homeownership education as vital components of essential skills for sustainable living.




Doug Staff a.k.a "Do-it-all Doug"
